Second Step/Social Emotional Update

As we move toward the second half of the school year, we will continue to put an emphasis on social emotional learning for our students. While social emotional learning is always important, COVID 19 has created some unique challenges for many students and we want to ensure that all of our students develop problem-solving skills, gain empathy for others, and develop resiliency to face various situations. With this year being the first year of K-5 program implementation, we are encouraged by the topics that are covered and meaningful discussions that are taking place in our classrooms.

In the second half of the year, Second Step will focus on emotional management and developing problem solving-skills. Sample lesson topics in these areas include:

Emotional Management

- K&1: identifying feelings, self talk, calming down strategies, managing anger, learning calming down strategies
- 2 & 3: managing emotions, handling mistakes, managing anger and anxious feelings, learning how to handle disappointment
- **4 & 5:** learning calming down strategies, managing strong feelings, managing frustrations, resisting revenge

Problem Solving

- K&1: fair play, handling having things taken away, fair ways to play, inviting others to join in
- 2 & 3: taking responsibility for your actions, playing on a playground, dealing with negative peer pressure
- 4 & 5: taking responsibility, making a plan, handling peer pressure, dealing with gossip, seeking help
- *Please note that the Second Step Program is different for each grade; grade levels were paired based on similarity of sample topics listed.

In addition to Second Step, students in Grades 4 and 5 will participate in an Internet Safety Presentation presented by Stonington Youth Officer Browning in the near future and our 5^{th} grade students will continue to participate in the VOICE Program.

Social Emotional Development is very important for every student! We aspire to help ALL students develop strong social emotional skills that will help lead them to success and happiness. Stonington Public Schools Equity Update

Stonington Public Schools recognizes the importance of diversity, equity, and inclusion in our journey toward creating an anti-racist and anti-biased school system. With the approach of Black History Month in February, the district wants to acknowledge that Black History is part of American History, and although there may be supplemental educational events and or lessons during the month of February, the district is committed to the integration of Black History and culture into the core curriculum throughout the year. The district's approach aligns with the guidance provided in the <u>Do's and Don't of Teaching Black History</u> written by the Teaching Tolerance organization.

Identity, stereotypes, equity and racism are topics that are addressed in grades K-8 on an ongoing basis through the Second Step curriculum and in the K-5, 9-12 **VOICE** Program, which will begin in the middle grades in March. In February supplemental lessons using Scholastic News or a variety of children's' literature may take place in celebration of the month. However, this does not replace the continuing work in securing books and other classroom resources that are reflective of our entire student population. The Stonington Middle School Family Anti-racism Circle commenced meeting in January and will continue to meet through April, exploring a range of books specific to racism. At both the Stonington Middle and High Schools, noteworthy, but often overlooked contributions and experiences of citizens of color will be highlighted.

Specials Update

Our goal for the year is to keep families informed about grade level curriculum in Art, Library, 5th Grade Band, Music, and Physical Education, and how they can support their children at home.



Art Miss Biernacki

We're very excited to be starting a new specials cycle! A new cycle means new, fun projects. We will continue working on the elements of art: line, color, shape, form, texture, value, and space, and we will continue to make connections between our art work and the world around us. Here are skills each grade level will work on:

- K-Identify shapes and lines, use shapes and lines in an artwork, build skills in various media through experimentation.
- 1 Identify different textures, create the appearance of texture with painted paper, use line and shape to create patterns, learn about art from different places, cultures, and times.
- 2 Experiment with color schemes, identify textures, create textured surfaces in model magic, incorporate art vocabulary when describing artistic choices.
- 3 Identify commonalities in cultural art traditions, use cross-curricular content to inspire works of art, use form to make 3D art, experiment with color mixing.
- 4 Use value to create the illusion of space/form on a flat surface, use weaving techniques to create patterns, interpret art using contextual information, subject matter, characteristics of form, and media.
- 5 Create sculptures by making forms out of wire, write artist statements using art vocabulary to describe personal choices, develop a work of art based on observations of surroundings, introduction to one point perspective.



Music Mrs. McMinn

We are excited to begin our 2nd rotation of each special this month! In the second five-week cycle for music, students will work on the elements of music including pitch and timbre. We will practice these using our "listening ears," reading notation, playing instruments, and movement. Here are skills each grade level will work on:

- K-Identify high/low, up/down, fast/slow, loud/quiet with "Carnival of the Animals" by Camille Saint-Saens.
- 1 Identify instruments and their sounds with "Peter and the Wolf" by Sergei Prokofiev. Read and perform pitches so-mi.
- 2 Identify instruments and instrument families and their sounds with "Peter and the Wolf" by Sergei Prokofiev.
 - Read and perform pitches do-re-mi-so-la.
- 3 Identify instruments, their families, and how sound is produced.
 - Read and perform pitches do-re-mi-so-la-do.
- 4 Identify instruments, their families, and how sound is produced.
 - Read and perform pitches on the treble clef staff.
- **5** Identify world instruments, their classifications and how sound is produced.
 - Read and perform pitches on the treble clef staff.




Library Mrs. Anderson-Halbert
