BOE Budget Presentation June 11, 2020

1) BOE Questions

- a. What is the cost per day to disinfect town buildings including materials and personnel? Answer: \$350/day
- b. What would the cost be to continue to disinfect non-district buildings in July and August? Answer: \$14,000 (\$350 x 40 days)
- c. What are the plans for the CARE funds? Answer:
 - i. Estimated total of \$280K
 - ii. SPS may net \$220K after non-public schools shares are distributed
 - iii. Expected uses include:
 - 1. Needs for COVID cleaning/disinfecting
 - 2. Needs for distance learning/tech
 - 3. Needs for staff/student mental health
- d. What is the cost to continue food distribution for July and August? Answer: The estimated cost for salaries plus materials is \$50,000. No funds are budgeted from the 2020-21 budget at this time. The state has applied for a waiver for federal funds. If the district and town want to continue offering these meals to our students, funding will need to be procured.

2) Ending Balance

- a. The recommended \$350,000 is available to return to the town.
- b. Anticipated needs in addition to \$350,000 = \$104,130
 - Purchase of one tractor. This item was pulled from the district CIP in anticipation of the town assuming landscaping/grounds responsibilities. This verbal agreement was negated due to budget constraints by the town. Cost = \$15,000
 - ii. Purchase new/replacement disinfectant foggers plus materials for 2020-2021. Cost = \$17,130
 - iii. Clerical screening of office desk areas. Cost = \$15,000
 - iv. Purchase contract for computer repair and replacement due to distance learning requirements. Cost = \$30,000
 - v. Install a required wall in the health center at SMS to assure privacy for screenings and examinations. Cost = \$27,000
- c. Amount to Health Reserve = \$90,870 (minimum plus other funds from encumbrances not realized by June 30)
