# Mental Health Note





Dear Grade 5 Parents,

I have the privilege of teaching school counseling lessons and facilitating restorative circles during fifth grade YouBlock on Fridays. The fifth grade teachers are instrumental in providing information about the current and future needs of their students, which guides lesson development and circle discussions.

The school counseling lessons have included **How to be an** 

**Upstander** and Teamwork. The purpose of **How to be an Upstander** is to teach students how to directly or indirectly address mean-spirited behavior, creating a more kind and respectful community. Teamwork provides students the opportunity to explore being a valued member of a team through a guided group activity.

Restorative circles are a way to promote openness and communication among students to help them celebrate, build community, make decisions, address and repair instances of unexpected behavior. Some of the circle topics have been about transitioning back to school and thoughtful communication. Students have interacted positively and maturely throughout these guided discussions by listening and offering feedback to one another.

- Was your child identified as a close contact of another positive case?



### **COVID TESTING and RESULTS:**

When indicated, **before** sending your child back to school, **please** contact the school nurse at 860-535-2235, ext. 6116 with the results of the test. Write your child's name and the date of the test on the test instructions, place the actual test strip near it, then email a photo of all of it to <a href="mailto:DMSnurse@stoningtonschools.org">DMSnurse@stoningtonschools.org</a>.

Your child should **not** return to school until the above instructions are completed.

# Change of Clothes

We continue to have children who come to the nurse looking for a change of clothes due to a spill or other accident. If clothing has been provided for your child, please wash and return. We are in need of socks, boys' underwear and pants (elastic waist works best)! Students in all grades should have a change of clothing (shirt, pants, undergarments, and socks, sneakers) to be kept in their lockers. Milk spills! Thank you.

# **Hearing and Vision Referrals**

Hearing and vision greatly affects your child's ability to learn. Please follow up as soon as possible with any referrals, and notify the nurse of appointment dates and outcomes of the visit. Submit the completed referral to the nurse as soon as possible so that we can best help your child at school.

## **FLU Vaccinations:**

Flu shots recommended by the CDC, and are required for DMS preschool students: Flu vaccine may lower risk for severe COVID-19, study suggests

### **COVID Vaccinations:**

Please provide a copy of your child's COVID-19 vaccination card once the series is completed. Having this on file will prevent unnecessary quarantine if your child is deemed a close contact of a COVID-19 positive person.

# **In-School Services Provided**

**Oral Health Services include:** 

- Screenings
- Exams
- Cleanings
- X-Rays
- Sealants
- **Oral Health Education**
- **Restorative Care**

The following fees/charges apply to Community Health Center, Inc.'s Mobile Dental Program.

For patients enrolled in HUSKY/Medicaid, services are 100% covered with no additional fees or charges.

For patient with private health insurance, services are billed to insurance. Patient/Family is responsible for any deductible and/or co-pay.

For patients with no health insurance the following fees apply:

- \$30 for Dental Hygiene visit (includes cleaning, X-rays and Fluoride treatment)
- \$18 per visit for exam by the Dentist
- \$25 per visit for sealants
- \$50 per visit for fillings (if services are available at your child's school)
